From Supervisor Libby Heiny-Cogswell:

Oshtemo Firefighters will be in your neighborhood this summer, testing fire hydrants and adding a thousand+ vertical wires that help locate hydrants in deep snow. Also, the Drake Farmstead Park timber frame barn construction is underway!

The Supervisor is working with the Township Board to develop the 2020 budget. Priorities recently discussed include building sidewalks on major roads, locating the first neighborhood park in an underserved area, continuing the sanitary sewer expansion (Phase I construction and Phase II engineering), police and fire protection, and improving township IT capabilities. By law the Township budget must balance, so multiple drafts and discussions in coming months will incorporate that critical parameter along with Board and community goals.

Many volunteers contribute so much to the operations of your Township! It is exciting to see the passion and community spirit they bring to a variety of ‘tables’—parks, business/neighborhood corridors, economic development, facilities, planning commission, historical society, etc. These citizens greatly extend the work of professional staff. Oshtemo Township is not small— we are 85th in population size in Michigan. Knowing all this, I would like to extend a Board AND community-wide sincere ***Thank You to our friends and neighbors who serve and volunteer***.

SUMMER TAX BILLS ARE DUE Monday September 16th. A 1% penalty is applied for every month not paid after the deadline. Another 3% penalty is applied if not paid by February 28th. Postmarks are not accepted for tax payments.


Tax bills are sent to the property owner unless a mortgage holder has requested it, which they must do for each tax season. If you receive a tax bill but have an escrow, you should forward the tax bill to your mortgage holder with a reminder they must request it from our office. If your mortgage company has requested the tax bill, you will not receive a copy, but may contact us and we will be glad to send you one. If you do not have an escrow and you did not receive a tax bill, you can get a copy of your tax bill, or verify taxes have been paid, by contacting the Treasurer’s Office at 216-5221 or on our website (www.oshtemo.org), which is updated daily. We accept credit cards at the counter and online. A 3% processing fee is charged by our credit card vender.

Please note taxes can be paid in person at the Township Office Monday through Thursday 8:00am – 5:00pm, and Friday 8:00am – 1:00pm. For non-business hours, you can use the **DROP BOX IN THE PARKING LOT, WHICH IS CHECKED DAILY.**

When taxes are collected by the Township, where do they go?

Below is a breakdown of how our taxes for both winter and summer are dispersed after collection. We used a home with a value of \$250,000 (taxable value \$125,000) baseline as an example. The large school operating amount would only apply if your home in Oshtemo is not your primary residence. The other school operating amounts will vary depending on the school district in which you live. The only amounts that stay entirely in the Township are the Township General Millage, Township Fire, Township Police, and Streetlights.

Oshtemo Fire and Rescue— Regional Trench Rescue Course - Operations Level



This month, Oshtemo joined the Kalamazoo Department of Public Safety to participate in a three-day operations level Trench Rescue course. This training focused on freeing a worker who is experiencing a medical emergency or the victim of a collapse inside an 8' deep trench. Instruction for the 25 participants was provided by the Michigan Urban Search and Rescue Association (MUSAR) who are nationally recognized for their contributions to trench rescue.

Rescuers learned the dangers of unstable soil, which can weigh up to 100 lbs/ft³, by conducting hands-on training in actual trenches. They practiced the skills of managing the scene, applying shoring and sheeting to an unsafe trench, and making entry to rescue a person trapped.

Oshtemo Fire Department's specialty is trench rescue in Region 5 of Southwest Michigan. Our members attend specialized training, participate in the Region 5 Technical Rescue Task Force, and operate the only trench rescue trailer in the entire region.

Mail Theft Still a Top Priority for KCSO

Since September 2017 Kalamazoo County has had a spike in Larceny of Mail complaints. 293 complaints received to date. Some packages, but mostly mail. Suspects are stealing checks in outgoing and incoming mail. The checks are then washed, rewritten and fraudulently cashed. Sometimes the account numbers are copied and written as new checks. The suspect cashing the check is rarely the person stealing them. They work in teams and are very organized.

These complaints are just for KCSO. They do not include any other agency in Kalamazoo. It is also often unreported as people do not care if junk mail is taken, may not know something was taken, or just don't feel the need to call.

The Kalamazoo County Criminal Investigations Division has a binder of over 40 known suspects detailing the crews and groups they work with. Lt. Baker is working on more detailed numbers, but would estimate we have received convictions on over 30 people during this time, several in cooperation with the US Postal authorities and suspects are convicted in Federal Court. However, it has not slowed anything down. Mail theft has continued to rise over the last three years. Oshtemo and Comstock Township have held the highest number of complaints. Triple almost every other township.

Please take note of the tips we are pushing out to the community to help protect them from mail theft and possible future fraud:

- Place outgoing mail in a mailbox at the post office. Do not place mail in your mailbox and raise the red flag. The flag is now a known symbol saying there may be something worth stealing inside.
- Check your bank account regularly to make sure checks were cashed, and for the correct amount.
- Arrange for package delivery pickup from the carrier or have someone watch the house to pick it up as soon as possible. Also consider sending your packages to your work place if allowed.
- Report any suspicious vehicles going up to mailboxes immediately to your local police, don't wait. If possible obtain a vehicle description, color and license plate. Do not follow or attempt to intervene as these suspects are known to carry weapons.



Planning—

Agritourism is now available in Oshtemo Township!

In an effort to conserve and provide more economic opportunities to large tracts of agricultural and rural lands, the Township recently adopted the Agribusiness and Agritourism Ordinances.

Agritourism is typically defined as an agriculturally based operation or activity that brings the public to a working farm for the purpose of enjoyment, education, or active involvement in the farm operation. These activities can range from small roadside farm stands where seasonal fruits and vegetables are sold to large centers that operate year-round and provide a multitude of agriculture experiences. The Township has expanded on this definition to allow activities to also occur on rural residentially zoned properties.

The Agritourism Ordinance is a result of the public outreach garnered during the development of the rural preservation strategies of the Township 2017 Master Plan Update. The intent of the Ordinance is to provide a wider range of opportunities for properties in the rural area of the Township that are tempered by the desired character of the area and the peace and enjoyment of other private property owners.

What can I recycle?



Unfortunately there is no simple answer, as it depends on the collection system and sorting facility used by your city or town. But your Department of Public Works will thank you if you depart from the world of “wishcycling” – crossing your fingers as you throw everything from pool toys and stuffed animals to coffee grinds in your recycle bin, hoping they will be taken away – and spend a few minutes educating yourself.

Here are a few tips:

1. Check your town or city’s website for a guide to recycling. Many communities or even states post a “recyclopedia” of what’s allowed and what isn’t.
2. Just because something is marked with the triangular recycling symbol doesn’t mean it can go in your curbside recycling. The biggest culprit is plastic grocery bags, which will gum up the machines at most facilities that take residential recycling. Most local grocery stores will recycle such bags, so bring them on your next shopping trip – and/or invest in reusable bags.
3. Food containers, particularly pizza boxes, can be too dirty to recycle. Scrape off that extra cheese, or only recycle the top half of the box.
4. Remove all plastic film, such as that found on the top of yogurt containers. Refrain from putting in long stringy items, like garden hoses or Christmas lights, which tangle up the fast-moving sorting machines and can cause injury to facility employees.
5. Don’t forget about the first two parts of the recycling triangle: Reduce and reuse.


