

From Clerk Dusty Farmer—

The Clerk's Office is busy gearing up for the KRESA Millage election this November, but we are also working on other projects in the Township.

Cemeteries have been a big focus over the last year as we work toward creating spaces that are pleasant to visit, provide a service to the community, and don't cost lots of taxpayer dollars to maintain. After approving the Cemeteries Master Plan, the Board made the decision to create a revolving maintenance fund for the Township cemeteries. This is a crucial component of the overall plan to ensure that cemeteries are self-funding.

In addition to the maintenance fund, we are moving forward with the development of natural burial spaces (also known as Green Burials) in our West Oshtemo Cemetery. This involves GIS mapping and pinning the ground for location finding. We also need to coordinate with the County for approval of the expansion of the cemetery. We do not expect this process to be completed this year, but be on the look out for the announcement as to when the Green Burial option will be available to the community.

Additionally, we are committed to cleaning up each cemetery. We have started removal of bushes, shrubs, and trees which are damaging surrounding headstones. Plantings are not allowed in the cemeteries, but this rule was not always followed in the past and we have to make an effort to correct the damage to property. Furthermore, we will be cleaning up the cemeteries twice per year (spring and fall) to remove decorations and other items that hinder the ability of our mowers to properly maintain the area. Overall, the community will see some big improvements to the cemeteries over the coming year!

#### **Special Projects:**

Township Investments: Applying new strategies to the investment policy, the Treasurer's office was able to increase investment interest revenues for 2019 by 196%. 2019 investment interest revenue is projected to reach \$150,000. This helps to offset an increase in taxes. (View graph below)

#### Taxes:

SUMMER TAX BILLS ARE DUE Monday September 16<sup>th</sup>. A 1% penalty is applied for every month not paid after the deadline. Another 3% penalty is applied if not paid by February 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020. <u>Post marks are not accepted for tax payments.</u> If you are waiting to pay your tax bill after the office closes on September 15, please use the drop box located in our parking lot.

If you have not received your Summer Tax Bill and do not currently have an escrow or mortgage account, please contact our office immediately. Be aware of mail theft in our Township. If you sent your Tax Bill payment from your home, please call to verify the tax bill was received by our office. If you are paying your tax bill by issuing a check through your online banking, be sure to put in the correct address, as some checks have been returned and not processed. Also, include your parcel number or property address for proper processing.

Please note taxes can be paid in person at the Township Office Monday through Thursday 8:00am – 5:00pm, and Friday 8:00am – 1:00pm. For non-business hours, you can use the <u>DROP BOX IN THE PARKING LOT</u>, WHICH IS CHECKED DAILY.

Many neighbors have asked about the sewer expansion. There is much good information available in the FAQs online. But that doesn't give the basic story of why the Township is expanding sewer. For me the expansion discussion began in 2009 when an Oshtemo couple explained they had nowhere else on their property to place a new septic field. In other words, their days were numbered for being able to occupy their home. Absent a long-term plan for sewer expansion into existing neighborhoods, the Township faced extensions happening unpredictably as individual emergency situations arose. The Sanitary Strategic Plan developed over multiple years of evaluating data and through many step-by-step Board decisions. In the end, the Board asked themselves the basic question—'Is the Township in the sewer public utility business or is it not?' After extensive thought the Board decided, "Yes, we are in the sewer business." The decisions followed to expand in a professional and methodical manner. A patch work system of lines and connections was determined to be unsustainable.

### **Mandatory Sewer Hookups**

Public Works has begun distributing a Second Notice Letter to unsewered properties in Oshtemo that have access to public sanitary sewer service. Oshtemo has made public sewers a priority in recent years to provide greater protection and management of our shared groundwaters. All of Kalamazoo County relies upon

ground water sources for drinking.
Notice is being sent to all property owners who currently have access to the public sewer system but have

system but have not yet connected. Out of 319 identified occupied properties in the Township, 55 properties have completed their connection to the public utility in the past year. To assist owners with financing this required property improvement, the Township offers an installment payment plan, up to 20 years, with an interest rate at 6.5%. For the Township's scheduled 2020 extension of public sewer into older neighborhoods, Oshtemo is arranging enhanced financing through the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Regardless, for most of the Township, USDA can provide individual low interest loans under its "504 Home Repair Program", for qualifying property owners with a limited income. While the mandatory connection program provides a two-year compliance window, please note that the Township grants 15-year effective lifespan of a septic tank, prior to the mandatory connection requirement deadline.

For the private-side connection work that individual owners will need to complete (i.e. installation of a sewer lateral to the house), the Township recommends getting 2-3 estimates from licensed excavators or sewer/septic firms before contracting this work. Following connection, residents will begin to be billed quarterly by the City of Kalamazoo for sanitary sewer service. m T}$ he Oshtemo Historical Society's upcoming Open House will highlight recent renovations to the historic Drake House and offer fun activities for adults and kids. Visitors can also preview improvements underway at the new park surrounding the historic home, slated to open later this year. A timber frame event barn, patterned after the carriage barn that once stood on the site, will be nearly complete and open for viewing. Made of locally harvested timbers, the barn includes event space and two accessible restrooms. A new ramp will provide accessible entry into the historic house for the first time. A new parking lot will be open and interpretive signs will be on display. Projects to be completed later in the year include a new picnic shelter and accessible crushed stone walking trail.

### **Drake Road Sidewalk Project**

The status of the Drake Road sidewalk and pathway project from Green Meadow Drive to West Main Street on Drake Road has been stalled due to utility conflicts within the public right-of-way. A preconstruction meeting was held with the Kalamazoo County Road Commission and Utilities last fall. It was anticipated that all utilities would be relocated in advance of our sidewalk work. Unfortunately, our construction project was well underway before Consumers Energy was able to complete their detailed design plans to relocate the buried electrical power lines. We have also learned that the task was deemed so challenging, that at least two private utility contractors have elected not to do the work. We understand alternative designs are now being explored by Consumers Energy. Due to the delay, our sidewalk contractor has vacated the project site. He will return to complete the last retaining wall and sidewalk once the utilities have been moved and relocated.

## Public Hearing for the West Main Corridor Improvement Authority

West Main Street, from Drake Road west to approximately 7<sup>th</sup> Street, is a premier commercial corridor in Oshtemo Charter Township. It contains many of the major retail, restaurant, and local service establishments in our community. Because of its attractive economic draw, additional

businesses are interested in developing within this corridor. While the Township has worked to proactively plan for this new development, revenue to address existing and potential future impacts is not readily available.

To account for this, the Township recently adopted the West Main Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA), which is governed by Public Act 57 of 2018. This Act is designed to assist local communities with funding improvements in commercial corridors. The Act allows the use of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) to make capital improvements within an established commercial district. TIF is not an increase in annual taxes. Properties within the District will pay their usual tax payments to the Township. What the Act does permit is the use of the taxes resulting from increased property values to pay for improvements within the established Authority boundaries.



This powerful tool is one of the only options for Townships to make targeted public improvements within an area. Michigan planning laws do not allow the Township to levy impact fees or development exactions, which help to pay for off-site public improvements that benefit the new development. Utilizing TIF funds within the potential Authority area would allow the Township to address specific public improvements that would not likely be funded by other means.

The boundaries of the District are properties along West Main Street from Drake Road west to the Township Hall. Currently, a 60-day public comment period is in effect on the West Main CIA Development and TIF Plan. A public hearing on the Development and TIF Plan is scheduled for October 22<sup>nd</sup> before the Township Board. All are welcome to provide input on the Plan either by email to <u>jjohnston@oshtemo.com</u> or letter, or at the public hearing on October 22<sup>nd</sup>.
