By the time this 'goes to press' my long tenure serving my community as Oshtemo Supervisor will be ended. The handoff to the next Supervisor Cheri Bell is going very well. Her commitment to the community and hard work already on the Parks Committee, HR Board Work Group, ZBA, PC, speaks volumes to her commitment.

I 'plugged in' to service to my community starting with planting trees with young children in Oshtemo Township Park. This continued with years of service on the Planning Commission starting in 1997. Thank you for your support for me to serve as Supervisor since 2008. I likely will continue to volunteer in some capacity. There has been much hard work through all these years. I have confidence in continuing positive municipal services given the great professional staff at the Township.

Closing story to share! Helios Solar installed the system, and from contractor Connor Fields, "This system is tied into the loads at the station. All power it produces will be used first in the station and then any excess flows back to Consumers' grid. In this case, Consumers acts to virtually "store" the energy you export for future consumption. If you add batteries in the future, you would store your own energy in lieu of exporting and have that energy available if the grid fails." The reduction in power usage at Station Two is funding the installation cost. Thanks to the Board for requesting a solar project in 2022. And thanks to another volunteer Oshtemo resident, a mechanical systems efficiency specialist with solar installation oversight experience. Gary Heckman identified Fire Station Two roof as an appropriate, "low hanging fruit" solar project location. The roof is South facing and large, resulting in a significant solar array.

Planning - Development in Oshtemo

Curious as to what development has been going on in your community? Look no further! The 2022 Planning Department Annual Report is here!

Every year the Planning Department produces a report that documents planning activities within the Township. This report includes projects worked on by the Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals in 2022 and gives a sneak peek into what is anticipated for 2023. The report provides an overview of what site plans, variances, ordinance amendments, and more have been approved or are ongoing within Oshtemo Township. Some highlights include:

Tournesol, a 49-unit, 60.5-acre, Open Space Community Site Condominium development of single-family homes at 7214 W N Avenue. **Faraday Defense**, construction of a 60,785 sqft two-story office and manufacturing/ distributions facility within the Western Michigan University Business Technology Research Park 2.

<u>**Taplin**</u>, complete redevelopment of 5070 W Michigan. This involves the demolition of three existing buildings onsite and the construction of a new 32,875 sqft maintenance and storage building.

The Village Childcare Center, establish a childcare center within three different suites in the exciting multi-tenant commercial center at 5320 Holiday Terrace.

Heritage Christian Reformed Church Preschool, establish a preschool within a church at 2857 S 11th. KABAS, establishment of a private school for the Kalamazoo Academy for Behavioral and Academic Success (KABAS) within a portion of a church at 2345 N 10th Street.

We thank our community volunteers on our Boards and Commissions for their time and effort in making Oshtemo what it is today and continually working toward expressing the community's vision for the future. We also would like to thank the members of the public that have and continue to contribute to these discussions. Non-Escrow Accounts - Those of you without escrow accounts can expect your summer tax bill in your mailbox the 1st week of July.

Escrow Accounts-For those with Escrow accounts, the bills will be sent directly to your mortgage company. If you would like a copy of your tax bill, please contact the Treasurers Office via email or phone and we can mail a copy to you, or they can be picked up at the Township Hall.

Summer tax payments can be made at the Township office starting July 1st and are due by September 14th. (Payments can be made at the Township office through February 28, 2024 but will be subject to additional penalties and interest starting September 15)

Payment Options:

Cash - Cash is accepted inside the Township Hall during normal business hours (please do NOT put cash in the drop-box outside).

Check or Money Order – Checks or Money Orders can be mailed, placed in the secure drop-box outside, or brought into the Township Hall during normal business hours.

Debit/Credit Cards- Processing fees for debit/credit cards is 2.75% of the total amount due and is paid to the company that processes our credit card payments. Cards cannot be processed over the phone, and must be processed in-person or online by the customer.

Online- I highly recommend the online option for everyone and is easily accessible on our website <u>www.oshtemo.org</u> under the "Tax Payments and Information" link. We accept VISA, MASTERCARD, AMERICAN EXPRESS, or APPLE PAY. The additional 2.75% credit card processing fee also applies to online payment. EFT/Online E-check using your routing and account number is another option and the fee for this is only \$1.95. Again, all fees charged here go to the processing company, not the Township. As always, if you need assistance or have questions about your taxes please feel free to contact the Treasurers Office.

Public Works—

Sewer

Construction Contracts for Phase 1 of the USDA Neighborhood Sanitary Sewer Expansion Project were awarded to Lounsbury Excavating on April 25th for \$10.2M. The USDA Bond closing is anticipated be the end of May. At this time, we will have a preconstruction meeting with Lounsbury and be able to discuss their proposed schedule. Then neighborhood meetings can be set up accordingly to discuss construction impacts and logistics and ask questions directly to the contractor.

Once sewer and road construction are completed and required testing is approved, residents will be legally notified and have two (2) years to complete their private connection. Septic tanks can be removed or properly abandoned in-place which includes pumping, crushing, and backfilling.

Final Design, easements and permits are underway for Phase 2. Staff expects to bid this portion of the project in Fall of 2023 with construction occurring in 2024 and/or 2025, based on contractor availability.

Non-motorized

Design work is underway for three (3) non-motorized projects this year, 9th Street on the West side from Stadium Drive to Quail Run Drive, Drake Rd on the West side from Stadium Drive to KL Ave, 11th Street on the West side from 350' south of Michigan Ave to Michigan Ave, Michigan Ave on the North side from Whitegate Ln to 11th Street and Whitegate Lane from Michigan Ave to Powderhorn Drive (side TBD).

Construction is anticipated on three (3) non-motorized projects this year, Western Woods and KL Ave on the North side from Drake Rd to Concord Place Apartments.
