Parks Department

Carriage Barn Improvements

The Carriage Barn at Drake Farmstead Park is getting a kitchenette! We have partnered with Kirshman Kitchen Design Studios and Pennings & Sons, who have both made generous donations to the project.

Kirshman Design Studios has provided the cabinets for the project at cost, and Pennings & Sons are donating the installation work. We sincerely thank our community partners who have made this project possible.

Fruit Belt Rail Trail

Plans for the development of the Fruit Belt Rail Trail take a major leap forward with the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund granting the Township an award of \$711,000. This funding will facilitate the development of approximately two miles of trail, transforming a historic rail corridor into a vibrant recreational space for the community. We are extremely grateful to the State of Michigan for this financial support.

The trail will be 10 feet wide with a crushed stone surface for non-motorized activities, and amenities such as benches, wayfinding and interpretive signage, paved parking areas, and even a bicycle repair station.

The property, once part of the Kalamazoo, Lake Shore, and Chicago Railway, has evolved over the years. In 2021, the Township acquired the approximately 35acre property from Ameritech/AT&T, paving the way for its transformation into a an inviting destination for outdoor enthusiasts of all ages.

This project is a priority of the "GO! Green Oshtemo Plan for Parks & Recreation, Nonmotorized Transportation, & Conservation", and we are especially pleased to be meeting that goal.

Although this section of trail is only two miles long, we hope that it will one day connect to another regionally significant rail trail between Kalamazoo and South Haven.

Construction is slated to start in 2025. Contact the Parks Department to learn more about the project, or get involved as a volunteer.

Infrastructure News

Sewer Update



The sanitary sewer expansion project remains on hold while our Public Works and Legal departments work to close the USDA bonds needed to complete Phase 1 and Phase 2. At this time, we do not have a timeline for the start of construction on the remainder of Phase 1 and

of Phase 2. Despite these hurdles, the Township continues to invest in sanitary sewer expansion. The installation work along Seventh Street and along M-43 between Seventh Street and Eighth Street has resumed with the thawing weather, and will be completed later this year.

2024 PAR(ticipation) Projects with RCKC



Every year, Oshtemo Charter Township and RCKC allocate funds for preventative and routine maintenance projects on the county local roads. This map outlines the projects planned for 2024:



Traffic Calming Activities Underway for Green Meadow Dr., Skyridge Ave., and Driftwood Ave. Neighborhood

Speeding (and other unsafe driving habits) are a major issue for residents living in the Skyridge neighborhood. The posted speed limit is 25 mph, but some drivers have been clocked going as much as 30 mph over the limit! With the proximity to schools and senior living, residents have petitioned the Road Commission of Kalamazoo County (RCKC) via the "Neighborhood Traffic Management Policy" to look at short and long term solutions to these concerns. If temporary enforcement measures implemented by the RCKC prove ineffective, physical calming measures may be considered (like speed bumps).

While these measures are generally effective at slowing people down, they come with a price tag. Not only is there a cost to install the infrastructure, but there can also be increased costs for additional wear and tear on vehicles, and decreased fuel efficiency. Please consider the safety of yourself and others, and follow all posted traffic rules.

New Bulk Trash / Recycling **Dropoff Voucher System Offers More Flexibility. Expanded Service to Residents**

Oshtemo Charter Township has offered its residents a service to dispose of bulk household trash items that are too large for regular household trash by bringing it to the Township Hall for more than 40 years. Affectionately known as "Dump Day", the service has remained largely unchanged since it started. One thing that has not stayed the same is the number of residents using the service. Early last year, we began to see a major uptick in the number of users compared to previous years. Cars started lining up more than a hour before the start time, and the lines got so long that vehicles were backed up onto M-43.

As the number of users steadily rose over time, the Township had to take measures to ensure the safety of residents and our staff. The Sheriff's Department got involved, and the Maintenance Department assigned more staff to try to keep the event under control.

By the end of 2023, it was obvious to the Township Board that this service which had run smoothly for many years had simply outgrown the capabilities of our staff to safely and efficiently manage.

A number of alternative options were explored, including curbside pickup, working with a waste transfer facility, and several hybrid options. Ultimately, it was determined that partnering with Waste Not Recycling would provide the best balance of service to residents and cost to the Township.

Starting in April, residents will be able to obtain Bulk



Trash / Recycling Dropoff Vouchers from the township hall, one voucher per residential address per month. Each voucher will allow residents to bring up to four yards of bulk household trash items to the Waste Not Recycling transfer facility at the southeast corner of Ravine and Nichols Road. Residents can use the service anytime during the facility's regular business hours (Monday-Friday 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday 8 a.m. to noon, Sunday closed) with a valid voucher. Waste Not Recycling's staff will be available to help residents unload their items inside of their covered facility.

Residents wishing to dispose of more than four yards of bulk trash in one month may choose to pay a fee for the excess, or bring the remainder back the following month with their next voucher.

The voucher will list the resident's address, and the resident must present a photo ID with a matching address to the facility's staff in order to redeem the voucher.

Where Do Your Taxes Go?

From Treasurer Clare Buszka

The treasurer's office collected over \$55 million dollars in tax revenue for the 2023 tax year.

One of the most common questions we get about taxes is what the Township is doing with all that money.

The truth is, most of the tax money we collect does not stay in the Township's coffers. This year, \$33.1 million went to education. That

includes the State Education Tax, Kalamazoo, Mattawan, and Otsego Public Schools, Allegan ISD, Van Buren ISD, KRESA, and KVCC. \$8.4 million went to County Programs, including the County's General Operations, Public Safety, 911, Seniors, Veterans, Housing, and the Juvenile Home. An additional \$4.9 million went to the Kalamazoo Public Library and Transit Authorities.

\$8.5 million stayed in the Township. Of that, \$4.1 million went to the fire department; \$2 million went to general township operation; \$1.2 million went to roads; and \$1.1 million went to our police contract with the Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Department.



Election News

We have received positive feedback from voters following the Presidential Primary in February, the first election

in Kalamazoo County to utilize early voting. In addition to no-reason absentee voting, voters can now cast their ballot in-person for nine days (starting the second Saturday and ending the Sunday before) a State or Federal election. We have partnered with Kalamazoo County to run four early voting sites, currently held at the County Expo Center, Portage Parks & Rec., the Fetzer Center, and the

Douglass Community Center. Voters can visit whichever location is most convenient.

Looking forward, we will have a small special election on May 7 for voters in the Mattawan Public School district. The State and Local Primary election will be on August 6, and the Presidential election will be on November 5.

My office is certified by the State to train election workers and ensure safe and secure elections. We are accepting applications for election inspectors and especially need Republican workers to maintain a healthy balance in the precincts. Workers are trained, certified, and paid at least \$15 / hour. Contact the Clerk's office for more information.

Safety News

Burn Ordinance & Burn Permits



With spring (and weekend

yard work) both well underway, the Fire Department wants to remind residents that a permit is required for the open burning of yard waste. You can obtain a free burn permit through our website at oshtemo.org or by calling the Fire Department at 269-375-0487.

To keep yourself and your neighbors safe, please abide by the following safety rules outlined in ordinance §256.000:

- Open burning can only occur when weather conditions are favorable and wind conditions are no greater than 15 MPH.
- Burning must be more than 25 feet from any structure or other combustible materials, and a distance of 50 feet for piles greater than 3 feet wide by 2 feet high.
- The burning of material containing paper products, building material, lumber, or lumber products is prohibited unless it is being burned in a burn barrel.
- A garden hose or fire extinguisher must be available at the burning site.
- Burning materials must be constantly supervised until the fire is completely extinguished.

The Fire Department may order that burning cease if the burning is unsafe or if smoke emissions are deemed to be hazardous. A Municipal Civil Infraction may be issued if the burn ordinance is violated.

A rider in the Oshtemo service zone will be able to book a ride through the new Metro Link app (available starting on April 10) or by calling 269-388-6373. The rider will be matched with others headed in the same direction for a quick, efficient shared trip. The app will also show riders the option to take fixed-route trips to their destination. The base fare of the rideshare service will be \$1.50 with discounts for seniors and those with disabilities. Payment can be made by debit or credit card through the Metro Link app when booking the ride. Metro Link has partnered with Via, a global leader in this developing form of public transportation with proven results in other Michigan communities.
